

Hepatitis B Virus (HBV) is highly endemic in Sub-Saharan Africa with 70 to 90% of the population becoming infected before the age of 40 years. Healthcare workers (HCWs) including healthcare students (HCSs) are at an increased risk of contracting HBV due to occupational exposure. Despite the availability of an effective vaccine, and its recommendation by Kenya's Ministry of Health, few HCW and students are vaccinated. The aim of this study was to evaluate the influence of awareness, attitude, practices, and access factors on hepatitis B vaccination uptake by HCSs at Kenya Medical Training College (KMTC).

Exclusive breastfeeding (EBF) is one of the key strategies to ensure infants and young children survive and grow. However, a 2010 study showed that it was only practiced by 50% of Tanzanian women. That study also found that men were rarely supportive; either at home or in the health facilities, due to their personal beliefs or to traditional beliefs and culture of the community. In this qualitative study, we used focus groups to assess the knowledge and attitudes of 35 men from three villages on the benefits of EBF, the disadvantages of not breastfeeding, and how they can support their partners' breastfeeding. In addition, we assessed how they felt about spending time at home, if they considered handling the infant to be rewarding and whether they helped the mother with home chores.

MicroResearch and Rotary International

In the past year, Rotary Clubs of Atlantic Canada and Uganda have become important partners to MicroResearch, providing funding for MR projects. To promote stronger connections between Canadian Rotary Clubs and Rotary Clubs in Uganda, Louisa Horne, Chair of the Rotary District in Atlantic Canada, accompanied MicroResearch to Mbarara, Uganda for the February workshop at MUST. While there, Louisa met with local Rotary representatives and attended portions of the MR workshop. We are excited to see these partnerships grow in the future.

Furthermore, to inform local Rotary members in Nova Scotia of the MicroResearch program, co-director Bob Bortolussi made a presentation at a regional meeting on March 7th. We hope to engage even more clubs going forward.



# Funding renewed for MicroResearch Nova Scotia

We are happy to announce that the IWK Health Centre and Nova Scotia Health Authority (NSHA) have generously renewed their respective funding for MicroResearch NS.
